





The Word

Pastor Aaron Baker Daily Bread, Mark 6:30–44, p.841

 30 The apostles returned to Jesus and told him all that they had done and taught. 31 And he said to them, "Come away by yourselves to a desolate place and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. 32 And they went away in the boat to a desolate place by themselves. ³³ Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they ran there on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. ³⁴ When he went ashore he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. And he began to teach them many things. 35 And when it grew late, his disciples came to him and said, "This is a desolate place, and the hour is now late. ³⁶ Send them away to go into the surrounding countryside and villages and buy themselves something to eat." ³⁷ But he answered them, "You give them something to eat." And they said to him, "Shall we go and buy two hundred denarii worth of bread and give it to them to eat?" 38 And he said to them, "How many loaves do you have? Go and see." And when they had found out, they said, "Five, and two fish." ³⁹ Then he commanded them all to sit down in groups on the green grass. 40 So they sat down in groups, by hundreds and by fifties. 41 And taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and said a blessing and broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples to set before the people. And he divided the two fish among them all. 42 And they all ate and were satisfied. 43 And they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish. 44 And those who ate the loaves were five thousand men.

Prayer of belief








The Work of the People

June Common Ground: For the month of June, Covenant will have two Common Ground classes in the Education Building for children and adults. You can read below about our family-oriented class on The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe which will meet in the Fellowship Hall, and we'll also offer three one-week classes in the Library. Coffee and snacks will be available in the courtyard, weather permitting. A nursery for children 0-4 will be available but the combined classes in the Education Building will replace our normal children and youth Sunday School classes.

Into the Wardrobe. In each week of this family friendly class, we'll read an excerpt from *The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe*, and discuss the ways that C.S. Lewis tucks the gospel story into his fanciful book full of good, evil and a never-ending winter. Kids and adults are invited to join us in the Fellowship Hall for this discussion-based class starting on June 4 at 10:15.

Visiting Missionaries: Carrieann and Nathaniel Shaver. Join us in the Library at 10:15 on June 4 to hear from Covenant's missionaries Nate and Carrie Shaver who work with Wycliffe in West Asia.

Prayer Walk. Join us for a prayer walk on June 11 during Common Ground. We'll gather in the Library to learn about the practice of prayer walks, led by Rachel Allmen, before heading out to pray for our neighborhood.

Feasts, Lost Sheep and a Tiny Mustard Seed: Throughout the Gospels, Jesus used parables to teach about the nature of God, faith and the kingdom. How should we read the parables? What can we learn from these short, punchy, and sometimes surprising stories and images? How do they relate to the rest of Jesus' teaching? Join us for this class on the parables at 10:15 in the Library. Today, Jennie von Drehle will teach on the Prodigal Son.

Not the Way It's Supposed to Be: Each week in service, we confess our sins together as a congregation. But what exactly is sin, and what has it done to us and to the world as God designed it to be? Join us for this class that will explore the doctrine of sin using Cornelius Plantinga's book Not the Way It's Supposed to Be. Class will meet in the Conference Room at 10:15.

Loss, Heartache, and Gospel Transformation: Living in this broken world, no one escapes heartache over the course of their lifetime. So, how do we experience the gospel in a way that breaks the patterns of harm so we don't continue to pass our pain onto others? In this class, we explore how Jesus invites his church to be a place of radical honor and honesty in telling our stories, the crucial role of grief and lament in discipleship, and how the gospel leads to real, lasting change in our hearts, minds, and bodies. Join us for this class taught by Pastor David Salsedo at 10:15 in the All Saints Room.

Summer Dinners Together: Join others from Covenant for potluck gatherings throughout the city this summer. One June 3, July 8 and July 29, Covenant is organizing backyard dinners for groups of 12-20 throughout the city.
