

Prayer of silent confession







¹ After this there was a feast of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem.

² Now there is in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate a pool, in Aramaic called Bethesda, which has five roofed colonnades. ³ In these lay a multitude of invalids—blind, lame, and paralyzed. ⁴ One man was there who had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. ⁵ When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had already been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be healed?" ⁶ The sick man answered him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up, and while I am going another steps down before me." ⁷ Jesus said to him, "Get up, take up your bed, and walk." ⁸ And at once the man was healed, and he took up his bed and walked.

Now that day was the Sabbath. ⁹ So the Jews said to the man who had been healed, "It is the Sabbath, and it is not lawful for you to take up your bed." ¹⁰ But he answered them, "The man who healed me, that man said to me, 'Take up your bed, and walk.'" ¹¹ They asked him, "Who is the man who said to you, 'Take up your bed and walk'?" ¹² Now the man who had been healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had withdrawn, as there was a crowd in the place. ¹³ Afterward Jesus found him in the temple and said to him, "See, you are well! Sin no more, that nothing worse may happen to you." ¹⁴ The man went away and told the Jews that it was Jesus who had healed him. ¹⁵ And this was why the Jews were persecuting Jesus, because he was doing these things on the Sabbath. ¹⁷ But Jesus answered them, "My Father is working until now, and I am working."

Sacrament of Communion



Leader: In the beginning you laid the foundation of the earth and created us in your image.


All: You set for us a Table in the Garden where we feasted together with you in peace.

Receiving Communion

Communion (also called The Lord's Supper or the Eucharist) is the family meal of baptized Christians. We invite all to partake of this sacrament who trust in Jesus Christ alone for salvation, and seek strength to live more faithfully for him.

Prayer for those searching for truth





COMMON GROUND CLASSES

Covenant Life Class: Join us for our Covenant Life Class taught by the staff. This 6 week class is for those who are interested in learning more about the church and the things we care about most, starting with the gospel. This class is a requirement for those who wish to become members. This class meets in the Conference Room of the Education Building at 10:15.

How the Universe is Designed for Discovery: The idea that the universe was designed for life is a central tenet of the Christian faith and a much debated point in philosophy. Less discussed, though no less evocative, is the idea that the universe might be designed not just for life but for discovery! In this series, we will examine some pivotal discoveries in physics which seem to suggest just this. David Hofman (Professor of Physics, University of Illinois Chicago) and Joshua Norton (Professor of Philosophy, Wheaton College) will co-teach this class in the Library of the Education Building. This week, they'll talk about rainbows and stars.

Envisioning God's World: We believe that all good things come from God and point towards him. In this class, we'll look at some concrete ways we see theology in works of art. Each week will center around a theological theme like transcendence, beauty or evil and talk through ways specific works of art expose this truth. Class will meet in the All Saints Room. This week, Martha Metcalfe will talk about art and transcendence.
